Child Protection


A Child Protection Policy operates in St. Joseph's Boys' School. It's aim is to protect our pupils by ensuring that everyone who works in St. Joseph's (teachers, nonteaching staff, substitute teachers, etc) has clear guidance on what to do if child abuse or neglect is suspected and what the procedures are for reporting it.

The overriding concern of all adults connected with St. Joseph's must be the care, welfare and safety of the child, and the welfare of each child is our paramount importance.

In all their contact with pupils, staff in St. Joseph's Boys' School follow the guidelines and procedures described in the DENI publication "Pastoral Care in School—Child Protection" (1999).

All policies or published documents in relation to the school will be available to parents who may forward these requests in writing, to the Principal. These may be collected from the school office during working hours.

It should be noted that information given to members of staff in St. Joseph's about possible child abuse cannot be held "in confidence". In the interests of the child, this information has to be shared with other professionals. However, only those who need to know will be told.
